Sandwiches, Lemonade, and Bees

Recently my eldest daughter asked if we could do something special when we take our next family vacation to Chicago. "Sure," I responded. "What would you like to do?" Her answer caught me by surprise: "Dad, when we are in Chicago and see someone on the street asking for help and food, can we buy them a sandwich?" Of course! My heart burst with gratitude for my child's empathy and generosity to someone in need. This is not merely something she has learned from

her parents (I would love to take the credit...), but I believe it is something she learned in the midst of this church community -- friends, parents, members, and adults -- faithful people who constantly speak and act in ways that make this world a better place because of their belief in a loving God.

There have been multiple times this year when I have been approached by our youth of the church desiring to do something to care for others and make the world better: Selling lemonade to help raise money for those who experience homelessness, building pollinator homes to help protect bees, dropping off socks and other items for the blessing box, and kids sharing toys and ideas that create welcome and wonder in this place.

We have a beautiful church community that cultivates generosity in many ways, and our children notice this. Our surrounding community notices this. When we offer generosity to others, we not only do it for them, we do it for Jesus.

In Matthew 25:31-46, Jesus tells the disciples a vision for what they must do for the kin-dom of heaven: "I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food or thirsty and gave you something to drink?"

Christian Generosity



As we enter the final months of the year and look forward to the upcoming holidays of Thanksgiving and Christmas, I am dwelling in gratitude for our church's generosity. I appreciate our congregation's great sense of justice and mercy, and support for those who are marginalized and oppressed. We work together to care for our neighbors and share the love of God through our actions and words, just like Jesus taught us to do.

In October, our Community

Dinner served over 100 meals for the 5th straight month. Our Blessing Box on the Northeast corner of the church has constantly been filled with food, books, hygiene items, and clothing, and been emptied just as quickly. We provided 20 dozen cookies and baked goods to Ripon College students in October to welcome them back on campus. In the last two months our congregation has provided seven \$25 gift cards from Websters and Kwik Trip to help community members in need with short term assistance.

There are so many opportunities to give and share, and as a Christian community we delight in our ability to be there for others. Sharing and charity are at the heart of Christian generosity, a spiritual practice which we are invited into each and every day.

Throughout November and December, I encourage you to think about how you practice Christian generosity in your own life and in your family's life. How do you receive God's gifts and share them?

We might also want to think how as a Christian community we share what we have with one another and with those in need. As I write this, our church staff and volunteers are preparing ways for our congregation to be generous in this season:

- The Fond du Lac Overnight Community Warming Shelter at
 Holy Family is a new organization opening on November 15.

- Our 2023 Stewardship Campaign, which helps our church budget for the 2024 year, is an opportunity for you to name that our church is important in your life and that the work we do in the community matters. Your pledge to financially support our ministry is an incredible gift to the Ripon community. Each year I challenge our congregation to have 100% participation in pledging to the church.
- A Pie Sale for Camp Scholarships will take place on Sunday, November 19. Pies will be made in the church kitchen by our children and youth and sold for \$25 each, and adults are welcome to donate a homemade pie to help us raise funds to send kids to camp.
- Our annual Christmas Eve Offering on December 24 will go to help a local charity or community need, and the recipient is selected by the Outreach committee each year.
- The UCC Christmas Fund for Clergy and Church Workers is one of our special "5 for 5 Offerings" which goes to help retired clergy and their families, and support those in ministry in emergency situations. You can make a donation to this fund anytime in November and December by noting "Christmas Fund" in the memo.

Abundant Life

You can do good in this life. Maybe it's giving a hungry person a sandwich. Maybe it's selling lemonade to help the homeless. Maybe it's making tiny homes for tiny pollinators. Whatever you do, you can make a difference. My child's desire to help someone with the simple act of giving them a sandwich reminds me of a line in a poem by Mart Oliver, "I don't want to end up simply having visited this world."

In November, I ask you to consider how this church has made an impact in your life, and how you can contribute to our mission and ministry. Your financial pledge is a symbol of your faith in this community to do justice, love kindness, and help all of us walk humbly with God. Our Stewardship theme is Abundant Life and centers around Jesus' declaration that "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly" (John 10:10). We will explore what "abundant life" really is, and how it involves participating in the generosity at the heart of God's mission. Over the course of the stewardship campaign, you will be invited to consider three aspects of genuine abundance – community, compassion, and justice/love – as well as the ways our church, by God's grace, helps provide those three gifts to the world.

Welcoming Jesus

Fred Rogers once gave us a piece of advice: look for the helpers. "When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news," Rogers said to his television neighbors, "my mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping."

In December we remember the story of Jesus' birth, and how, as a baby, the helpers showed up: a donkey carried Mary to Bethlehem, a star showed the way, an innkeeper loaned them a stable, magi gave extravagant gifts, and an angel warned them to seek safety from King Herod. Our Advent Worship Series, The Work of Christmas, helps us to look at the question: How do we welcome (baby) Jesus in our daily lives?

- Dec. 3, Advent 1 The Work of Christmas: Shelter. Do we find Jesus shelter?
- Advent 2, Dec. 10 The Work of Christmas: Safety. Do we keep Jesus safe from harm?
- Advent 3, Dec. 17 The Work of Christmas: Food. Do we feed Jesus?
- Advent 4, Christmas Eve, Dec. 24 The Work of Christmas: Emmanuel (God with Us). Do we only worship Jesus and not do the work of helping Christ in this earthly world?

Participating in God's Generosity

I hope you will join us in these acts of generosity, and explore how together, we can make a meaningful difference in Ripon. I leave you with the poetry of Howard Thurman (1899 – April 10, 1981), who wrote this famous Christmas poem, The Work of Christmas:

When the song of the angels is stilled,

When the star in the sky is gone,

When the kings and princes are home,

When the shepherds are back with their flock,

The work of Christmas begins:

To find the lost,

To heal the broken,

To feed the hungry,

To release the prisoner,

To rebuild the nations,

To bring peace among people,

To make music in the heart.

May you be blessed, and be a blessing to others,


